WEATHER: The weather in Lima is usually described as mild and warm throughout the year, and it is one of the driest capitals in the world. Average temperatures range from the mid 60s to the high 70s, and relative humidity is very high, producing quickly passing morning fogs. In the highlands of Cuzco and Machu Picchu, average temperatures are in the mid 60s and rain is likely. On the cruise, we will be traveling in a tropical climate and the weather will be quite warm. Temperatures may reach the high 80s or low 90s. It is a good idea to take a hat and sun screen to protect against the sun's intense rays.

CLOTHING: Comfortable, casual clothing is suggested in natural, "breathable" fabrics. Everyday slacks, khakis, walking shorts, and everyday skirts or dresses are recommended. A mixture of lightweight clothing that can be layered is suggested. Mix-and-match color schemes work well to keep baggage light. You will find a significant amount of walking over uneven terrain or cobblestone streets during your time ashore. Comfortable walking shoes with good ankle support are highly recommended. Recommended onboard clothing is resort or country club casual. Formal attire is not required. Casual jeans, t-shirts, tennis shoes, and flip flops should not be worn to dinner. The ship has a full service spa and fitness center, hot tubs, and a swimming pool, so please bring clothing for these activities if you wish to participate. For those doing the extension to Machu Picchu, it is recommended that a lightweight raincoat or poncho and/or umbrella be brought. Please note that use of walking sticks is prohibited in Machu Picchu unless they are needed by guests with mobility problems.

DOCUMENTATION: US Citizens must have a passport valid at least 6months past the tour dates (October 15, 2017). The name on travel documents should match the name exactly as it appears on the passport.

Optional Pre-Cruise Extension to Machu Picchu

Delve into the sacred and mysterious landmarks of the Inca Empire, including famed Machu Picchu, the Lost City of the Incas, and other ancient temples, all precisely constructed without mortar.

SUNDAY, MARCH 26 - Today, we will fly to Lima, Peru. Upon arrival, we will be met by a representative and transfer to our hotel for an overnight stay.

MONDAY, MARCH 27 ● B, L - Following breakfast at the hotel, much of the morning is devoted to the flight from Lima to Cuzco, once the capital of the Inca Empire. After arriving in Cuzco, we will transfer to a local restaurant for lunch. After lunch embark on a city tour of Cuzco starting with Sacsayhuaman Fortress. Strategically located on a hill overlooking Cuzco, the fortress was constructed without mortar like many other Inca structures. Yet the enormous stones (some weighing 200 tons) of the remaining walls fit so tightly that not even a thin blade of grass can slide between them. The craftsmanship is a stunning example of the Inca's sophisticated construction techniques and architectural skills. Our next stop is at the sacred site of Koricancha. Here, we will admire the lovely Dominican Convent of Santo Domingo that was built on the foundations of the Temple of the Sun, the most sumptuous temple in the Inca Empire. The curved, mortar-less masonry wall at the west end of the church is considered to be one of the greatest existing examples of Inca stonework. Continuing on we will see the splendid Baroque-style Cuzco Cathedral, built in the mid-1500s on the foundations of an Inca palace. Many of the stones used in its construction were looted from the nearby Sacsayhuaman Fortress. After our city tour we will transfer to our hotel where we will check in and the remainder of the evening is at leisure. Dinner is on your own.

NOTE: All of the rooms at our hotel have an oxygen enriched system to help acclimate to the altitude.

TUESDAY, MARCH 28 • B, L - Following breakfast at the hotel, we will drive to the train station and board the Vistadome Train, which features large panoramic windows for excellent viewing of the passing landscape. Upon arriving in Aguas Calientes, we will drive to the ruins of Machu Picchu to explore this famous "Lost City of the Incas." Constructed as a royal retreat for the Inca emperor Pachacuti in the 1400s, Machu Picchu was abandoned less than 100 years later, its population probably devastated by smallpox. Because the Spanish conquistadors never found this hidden city, Bingham discovered it largely intact. Architectural highlights include the Temple of the Sun, designed much like the one in Cuzco, several other temples, hundreds of terraces, and a mysterious carved stone situated on a raised platform that towers above the plaza. The stone may have been used for astronomical observations, but no one knows for certain. The Inca had no written language, so there is no record of Machu Picchu's ultimate purpose. Scholars are still striving to uncover clues as to its mysteries. After visiting Machu Picchu, we will return to Aguas Calientas and enjoy lunch at a local restaurant before boarding the Vistadome Train back towards Cuzco. Upon arriving in Ollantaytambo, you will transfer back to the hotel for the evening and dinner is on your own.

Wednesday, March 29 ● B - Following breakfast at the hotel, we will transfer to the Cuzco Airport for our return flight to Lima. Upon arrival, we will transfer to the port of Callao to embark the ship.

Please note: As this is an active program which takes place at high altitudes, we strongly recommend that all guests should consult with their physician regarding their ability to participate prior to signing up. Participants should be prepared to negotiate a mixture of surfaces which may include inclines, cobblestones, sand, and gravel or natural paths. There may also be a need to climb steps or stairs on occasion. Guests who utilize a wheelchair and those with mobility concerns are advised to check in advance to see if any portion of the tour program may not be considered suitable for their individual situation.

OUR PORTS OF CALL

SALAVERRY, PERU

Founded by the Spanish conquistador Pizarro, Salaverry has numerous archaeological excavations. The port leads the way to Trujillo, the nation's second largest city, beautifully situated before the Andean foothills. Today much of its colonial charm is retained in its old churches, balconied homes, and courtyards with overhanging flower baskets.

ROATAN, HONDURAS

Luxuriate on the magnificent beaches, snorkel or dive and explore the superb shallow reefs, or discover the island's other natural wonders on a horseback ride on the beach and through a tropical forest past spectacular volcanic rocks.

GUAYAQUIL, ECUADOR

The largest city and main port of Ecuador, Guayaquil has become a popular tourist destination. Enjoy a long walk along the riverfront, where shopping and sightseeing go hand in hand thanks to the numerous malls, parks and historical monuments.

FUERTE AMADOR, PANAMA

One of the entrances to the Panama Canal on the Pacific side, the port of Fuerte Amador, founded in 1519, is a short drive from Panama City. Explore the beautiful French and Spanish colonial homes in Panama City's Casco Viejo, marvel at Panama's lush rainforest or visit a secluded Indian village.

SANTO TOMAS, GUATEMALA

Visit fascinating Quiriguá and its stunning Mayan monuments. Take a boat ride along the Rio Dulce to Lake Izabal past riverside Mayan villages, lush tropical vegetation and Fort San Felipe.

HARVEST CAYE, BELIZE

Featuring an enchanting range of environments such as tropical rainforests, marshes and coral reefs, Harvest Caye offers both relaxation and adventure amid lush landscapes. This 75-acre paradise invites you to explore its incredibly biodiverse surroundings, witnessing exotic wildlife or perhaps discovering the world's second largest coral reef. Gain insight into the region's Mayan and Garifuna roots, discover traditional arts and traditions at the local artisans' village or simply soak up the abundant Belizean sunshine and relax.

MANTA, ECUADOR

As a gateway to Ecuador, the small port city of Manta is a short drive from Montecristi, where the world's best Panama hats are produced and also where they originated.

PUERTO LIMON, COSTA RICA

Ride the aerial tram through the rainforest canopy at Braulio Carillo National Park. Take a boat ride through the Tortuguero Canals or the Estero Negro estuary, the rich jungle tapestry all around, while watching for colorful birds, monkeys, iguanas, sloths, crocodiles and the legendary, iridescent Blue Morpho butterfly.

COSTA MAYA, MEXICO

The cruise port of Costa Maya in Mexico's developing Costa Maya region is surrounded by dense jungle and turquoise waters and blessed with radiant sunshine. No wonder the ancient Maya lived nearby, building ceremonial centers like Chacchoben, where you can climb among the ruins, many of which are still being excavated. Look for raucous toucans in the trees.

KEY WEST, FLORIDA

Visit the Key West Butterfly and Nature Conservatory, which houses an impressive collection of flowering plants, cascading waterfalls and 50 different species of butterflies from around the world. Continue to the aquarium, Key West's oldest attraction, dating back to 1935 and home to hundreds of different species of local sea life. Don't miss the historic home of author Ernest Hemingway.
